COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This class studies the legal and philosophical basis of the juvenile justice process along with a review of the juvenile court procedures in Michigan. Problems related to delinquency and its control are discussed.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- Define the term “juvenile delinquency” and identify major components in the study of delinquency.
- Describe the nature and extent of delinquency.
- Describe the Choice and Trait theories as they relate to a study of juvenile delinquency with emphasis on individual choice.
- Describe the Social Structure Theories which seek to explain the onset of delinquency.
- Describe the Social Process Theories which attempt to explain juvenile delinquency and compare to Social Structure Theories.
- Describe the Social Reaction Theories as attempts to explain the onset of delinquency.
- Identify the main points of the gender and delinquency relationship and the family and delinquency relationship.
- Describe the main points of the relationship of peers and delinquency and describe the influence of Gang Theory.
- Describe the role of schools in the development of delinquency patterns.
- Describe the main concepts of the interconnection between police work and juveniles.
- Identify the main components of formal juvenile court processes.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION:

Any combination of the following may be utilized during this course: discussions, web links, online assessment, class participation, exams, papers, readings.

TERM PAPER:

An original six (6) full page of text (not including cover page or Works Cited page) term paper is due by 11:00pm, Monday, December 3, 2007. The paper must be written in Modern Language Association (MLA) style, double spaced, utilizing 12 point font size. The topic of the paper will be one of the delinquency theorists discussed in Chapter 3 of our text. The paper should include the theorist's background, a summary of his or her work and whether or not you agree with the theory and reasons why. A minimum of three (3) sources must be utilized and cited in the paper. At least one (1) source must be a book, newspaper article, magazine or printed material other than our

textbook. Additional references may be taken from the internet or other printed materials. The paper will be graded based upon original content, length, clarity of expression, spelling, adherence to MLA format and timeliness of submission. The paper must be received by the instructor via UCompass by the date and time below. **The term paper must be composed using Microsoft Word software. No other format will be accepted and no credit will be given for papers submitted in formats other than MS Word.**
